President Beaderstadt called the meeting to order at 7:06 p.m.

II. Roll Call:

Roll was called and a quorum was established. See #1 on attached sheet.

The Board reviewed the regular board minutes, financial statements and bills.

Grala moved and Stone seconded a motion to approve the minutes of the regular meeting for February 21, 2017, the monthly financial statements for the fiscal year through February 28, 2017, the Bill Reports for February/March 2017, and payment of the bills. Motion passed 5-0. See #2 on attached sheet.

VIII. Librarian's Report

- Scholtz reported that the CCS Governing Board meeting for March was moved to
 April 12th to allow for negotiations between CCS and Polaris regarding migrating the ILS.
 The Governing Board to be completed will vote on the contract at the meeting. Scholtz
 reported that although Polaris will be more expensive for CCS than Sirsi-Dynix, the
 library's budget should not be impacted.
- Scholtz reported that three vendors have communicated with him in response to the RFP for RFID. Scholtz said that he had used ranges for numbers of units in the RFP because different companies had difference sizes for their physical products. This was also a way to make the vendors quote per unit costs rather than a group price, which would allow for transparency as to what we are paying for. Stone asked if implementing RFID would result in a reduction in the number of staff. Scholtz replied that that was not his intention. Circulation staff would be freed from some repetitive tasks and made available for tasks that required face-to-face interaction with the public. Scholtz commented that changing both the ILS and the security system might actually be easier for staff.
- Barb Majka, the new Circulation Manager, introduced herself to the Board. Board Members who had gone to Algonquin Public Library to see their RFID setup reported that the staff at Algonquin had spoken highly about Majka.
- Building staff have installed LED bulbs in the pendant lights in the library's main room. Scholtz passed an example of one of the light bulbs around the table. He informed the Board that the LED bulbs that had been installed previously in strip lighting had immediately reduced the electrical bill and that these pendant bulbs would further reduce the costs to the library. He did not know how long it would take the lights to pay for themselves but agreed that it should take only a few years.
- Scholtz passed around library use surveys that had been filled out by patrons using the AARP tax preparation service in the library.
- Gunness informed the Board about the Centegra Health Challenge that had run for eight weeks during January, February, and March. The challenge was a group effort to lose weight and improve health among staff members. Twenty-two people were involved and everyone lost weight or inches. Winning individuals and teams will receive rewards.
- Edminster showed the Board a plaque that the library had received from the local St. Baldrick's campaign for participating. The library team had four members and raised more than \$2,000 for the national St. Baldrick's campaign. The library raised \$680 for local families. More than 480 participants had their heads shaved to raise \$161,000 for pediatric cancer research. More than \$21,000 was raised for to aid local families with children with cancer.

- Scholtz will be meeting with the editor of Shaw Newspapers to discuss getting the rights to scan the microfilm copies of *The Plaindealer* newspaper that the library owns. The editor has proposed that the library provide columns for *The Northwest Herald* derived from *The Plaindealer* perhaps as often as once a week.
- Scholtz informed the Board that the Youth Services Manager had decided to replace the open Assistant YS Manager's position with a new type of position, a lead librarian who would be involved in training rather than managing the department.
- Scholtz reported that the library's study rooms had been repainted and the furniture replaced under the supervision of Jakacki. Jakacki is also involved in choosing the type of carpet to replace the existing carpeting in the main room.

 - Repair of carpet in the "River Area" of the library verses replacing carpet in the main library
 - Scholtz met with Sarah Keister Armstrong to discuss possibly reviewing and updating the current long-range strategic plan with the Board and Staff

- J. Velasquez visited the Wauconda Area Library, speaking to Norma Hacke, their Bilingual Specialist, for an hour and 15 minutes. She showed her the adult Spanish collection, upstairs, and also their children's Spanish collection. She learned about all the programs Wauconda offers and how they promote their programs. It was helpful to visit with another Bilingual Services Librarian as there is not a lot of networking opportunities for staff in this type of position.
- S. Baseley has been attending many webinars to keep herself up to date on trends on Youth and YA Literature. She learned about new materials in YA focusing on LGBTQ characters, and Junior Non-fiction. Also, how to use picture books to teach tolerance.
- M. Cairo was invited to spend the morning at Montini School to share stories and book talks with students in grades Pre-K through 3rd grade. While we have had success in visiting public schools in the area, it has been more challenging to get into the local private schools so we see this as a great step towards more school partnerships.
- G. Doolan assisted in giving a tour to Valley View Kindergarten students. During the tour
 Gwen carries a blown up McHenry library card to show the children what the card can do
 for them. When the kids regrouped with M. Cairo one of the children told them that they
 liked the big card and was coming back to get one. Later that day the child did come
 back with his mom and got his own library card!
- C. Bergan held a meeting with the school liaisons (M. Cairo and J. Velasquez) to touch base regarding our school services and what is needed as the school year starts to wrap up. They contacted schools to set up Summer Reading visits and have gotten a good response so far. C. Bergan wrote and submitted a proposal to present at the District 15 and 156 Choice Menu conference next school year. The proposed presentation is a book talk of titles with interrelated themes and resources.

- T. Calhoun has been creating some displays for the Youth Department. This month her displayed featured Steampunk for Teens, Poetry for Teens and Spooky Stories for Junior Readers. She also has become familiar with LibraryAware in order to create booklists to accompany displays and did one for the Steampunk Display.
- L. Jakacki has been working on a letter to the Directors of the NSDC libraries to discuss how the consortium is seen by patrons and how we can continue to offer a digital materials service that is in line with our print material collections.

The TS Dept. added 1691 items (-+11%) and withdrew 919 (-32%) compared with March 2016. Staff also mended 705 (-30%) items and processed 1715 new items (+12%). Only AdBk increased in circ. (+4%); all other formats decreased in circ. Including ILL (borr. -10%/lend - 11%). Overall circulation decreased by (-4%) from the previous year/month and we were open 1 more day than last yr./mon. (29 compared to 28). Circ was at 48,826 compared with 50,703 last yr/mon. All areas except AAud and Vid/DVD decreased in Circulation. Holds increased (+13% but renewal decreased (-4%). Patron traffic increased by +10% (16,750 but the video count ave. was only 15,094. Website use (+23%); wireless (+52%); holds/renewals (+1%/-6%, respectively.

Also our eMagazine/Zinio was at (-35%) with digital downloads (-3%), Zinio and Hoopla were at (-35% and +5% respectively. Internet use (Adult +8 and youth +15%) but overall, use declined by -4%). Our study room use decreased by (-7%) but meeting room use increased by (+10%). The Children's Storytime Rm. Was used by AARP for Tax help – we received 308 total surveys regarding AARP tax help and library use. Programs for age groups: (adult +29%; child -26%; teen -20%). Patron count from video was 15,537; down from last yr/mon. total of 16,388 (-5%). As some added information, CCS libraries ILLed 68,263 items to each other in March 2017; MPLD was 8th on the list of providing the most material (3105 items loaned).

As for people coming in for AARP tax help – here is the profile of the ave. user. Not their 1st visit for tax help (84%); equally divided between MPLD cardholder and not (47% yes; 53% no). 32% and 36% of people coming into the library also came in to check out materials and use computers. 73% of respondents said they would be return users. 92% of respondents included their name and phone.

RE: 2017 Potential Projects – NEW board update

DATE: 2/21/2017

The purpose of this memo is to outline some of the potential projects looming before the MPLD in 2017 and beyond so that the board/administration can prioritize them relative to the budget, calendar of events and the strategic plan. I would like to elicit board and staff opinions regarding these projects, budget and time schedules. Hopefully, we will begin discussion of these projects in January 2017 and beyond:

1) Retrofit and enlarge the existing solar panel array (scheduled for 4/2017, weather dependent)

Retrofitting and enlarging the solar array will hopefully begin in Mid-March 2017, weather dependent. P. Labera, Magiteck Energy Solutions, Inc. will meet with me 2/20. 20kWh total new panels + new structure, SREC credits to enhance payback. Est. \$53,000.

- 2) Staff/board visits to other area libraries concerning RFID, gates, self-checks, etc.
- J. Scholtz completed RFID RFP. Board will authorize document to be sent out 2/21/17. Envisionware, MK Solutions, 3M, and Tech Logic will be sent RFP. Implementation of system to correspond with new ILS (CCS Polaris) implementation, Spring 2018. Est. \$250,000.
- 3) Repair/replacement of main floor carpeting project involves closing library, moving books/stacks, carpet removal + floor prep for new carpet, new carpet installation. Original carpet cannot be repaired easily/well and may cause a tripping issue for staff/patrons needs to be replaced but only if we plan to occupy this building for 5+ years.

Mueller Interiors (Crystal Lake) contacted. Depending upon price/vendor, we may have to go out for bid but they have done work for us before – GSA pricing?? No pricing on carpeting removal/replacement yet. I've also been in contact with Hallett Moving Co. to look at moving library stacks relative to this project – \$19,760 for moving stacks.

- 4) Discussion with Gillespie Design concerning a new annex (for YS Dept.+ meeting rooms). This project could be combined with #3 (a necessity) and/or #5? Could we site the annex for use now and continued use if attached to a new building to the North/West? (Sometime in future)
- 5) Installation of a lift station for sanitary sewer to replace shared system (must this project be done to accommodate #4? It involves the DOT.) (est. \$256,000)

I attended 1st IDOT meeting for re-construction of Rte 31 (2/8). We can barter land acquisition of our property for replacement of our community sanitary sewer line (not recommended) or attachment to an already installed lift station (attaching to city owned sewer on East side of Rte. 31). Est. for lift station project, \$256,000). When is IDOT doing the project?

What kind of carpet repairs can we make to the existing carpet/seams to extend the life of the carpet (originally installed in 1994)? Could we do #3 without doing #4? – Yes. But, if we are thinking about doing #4, how long should we wait to do it because #3 only gets worse? How do we fund #3 and 4? Do we need to do #5 before OR co-incidentally with #4 (due to state/city building codes)? In terms of moving YS, what would we use the existing space for – how would we rearrange space for Adult? For #3 and #4, we would need to be closed to the public for a period of time – possibly to staff as well. If there is a short period of time between the 2 projects, it would be best to link them together to be closed for the shortest amount of time, accomplishing the most activities/changes at one time (my opinion). We would also spend less money relative to the two projects.

Underlying these projects is the ultimate question – Are we going to stay in this building and, if 'yes', how long? Will it be worth it to build an addition/annex, install new carpeting, etc.? My initial answer to this question after being in the community for 9+ years is "Yes." It would be much more expensive to build a new library and building referendums don't have much success in this area. We could potentially do all of these projects with 'saved' money - very little financing.

Congratulations to all of us for successfully completing our ILS investigation, and for approving the Polaris (Innovative) contract today at the Governing Board meeting. Now that this significant milestone has been achieved, we are officially out of contract negotiations and are beginning the migration to Polaris. Our target timeline is to go live with Polaris around April 2018.

Here's what to expect over the next week or so:

- 1) Innovative and CCS will jointly write a formal press release announcing that CCS will be migrating to Polaris. Directors can distribute it individually as desired, to local news outlets or anywhere else you feel appropriate for your community. You don't have to wait for the press release to make announcements, but I wanted to let everyone know it was coming in case you didn't want to write your own.
- 2) CCS will begin distributing information about the migration strategy, including information about the implementation framework, decision-making strategy, and participants. Now is a great time to make sure you and all of your staff are signed up for the CCS Migration Update email.

Thanks to everyone for participating in this long, complex, and rewarding project. I know we're all looking forward to building a new bright future with Polaris.

The theme of this year's National Library Week, being observed this week, is "Libraries Transform," a fitting way not only to reflect on how libraries themselves are adapting, but also how they are able to change you and me.

Libraries also can save lives. They have mine - at least twice.

The first time was when I was in junior high. Those were dark days, when bullying made life a struggle. In the midst of it all came Mrs. Talluto, our school librarian, one of the kindest, coolest, most wonderful people I've ever met. I'll never know for sure whether she knew of my plight, but she invited me and my best friend, Robbie. to become library assistants. That meant that I could eat my lunch in the library office and shelve books during recess instead of being my tormentor's easy target.

The library then was a refuge, a sanctuary and a godsend. It was a place where my nerdy nature was nurtured and I could be myself, even if that meant trying to memorize the Dewey Decimal System or read my way through it.

In high school when I was a member of the debate team, libraries were essential. It's hard to build a case for uniform laws in the court system or employing all employable people in the U.S. without some facts to back it up.

This quest took me to the libraries at McHenry County College, as well as the University of Michigan, where I went to debate

What's a university experience without a library? However, not only did I spend many, many days and nights studying in the libraries at Northwestern University, but I also had my work-study job at the Evanston Public Library. That's where, in the Technical Services Department, I met even more wonderful librarians who were mentors and friends.

was when I was working nights at the Northwest Herald on the copy desk. Remember that awful heat wave in 1995, the one where more than 700 people died in Chicago over a fiveday stretch? At that time, I was living in an apartment on Williams Street in Crystal Lake that did not have air conditioning.

To escape the oppressive heat, I spent a number of pleasant days at the air-conditioned Crystal Lake Public Library.

No doubt, had I stayed home, I would have melted almost as badly as the candles I kept

in my living room.

In the years since, I've had the great privilege to visit a number of our area's libraries for personal and professional reasons. If you haven't visited your local library recently, I encourage you to do so. Many have special events

this week in honor of National Library Week. Stay awhile and look around.

Libraries today offer far more than books and children's story times. In this age of "alternative facts," librarians are trained to help you get actual facts about just about anything. Need help with a job search? Trying to track down a long-lost relative? Want to find a book about journalism to read to kids? Librarians, amazing people that they are, can help. (And have, particularly on that last one.)

So, to all my librarian friends past and present, happy National Library Week. And if you haven't visited your library in a while, in person or online, please do. After all, it just might save your life. It did mine. At least twice.

Expert to speak about Woodsta fight for civil liberties during W

UNION – Eugene Debs left Woodstock in November 1895, after his release from McHenry County Jail, but his legacy and fight for free speech has not been forgotten.

On April 25, Woodstock Celebrates Inc., the McHenry County Historical Society and the Illinois Labor History Society will co-host a program exploring Debs' fight for civil liberties during World War I. The 7 p.m. program features author Ernest Freeberg, a distinguished professor of humanities at the University of Tennessee. Doors open at 6:30 p.m. at the McHenry County Historical Society Museum, 6422 Main St., Union.

"Debs was a part of Woodstock's history, and his fight for free speech still echoes throughout America and the world," said Kathleen Spaltro. program chairwoman for Woodstock Celebrates. "It's important not to lose this connection to history, especially when Debs' right to protest is very much in tune with current concerns."

Debs was president of the American Railway Union in 1895 when he was imprisoned in the McHenry County Jail in Woodstock for six months for disobeying a court injunction that sought to end a strike against George Pullman's

massive factory and company town in Chicago. In support of Pullman workers, who had suffered from wage cuts, higher rents and high food costs during the recession of 1893, ARU workers refused to handle Pullman sleeper cars on passenger trains.

McHenry wrestler earns All American honor





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language preventing non-Medicaid-expansion states from becoming expansion states - and got it. They asked for flexibility for states to change "essential health benefits" - and got it.

But each time they got a concession, and were asked to support the bill. they instead came up with new sets of demands that made the legislation increasingly unpassable. Eventually it became clear to Trump that the Freedom Caucus would never take ves for an answer. So he cut them off, sending former Freedom Caucus member Mick Mulvaney, his Office of Management and Budget director, to Capitol Hill to deliver a message: The president was done negotiating.

That was the moment the Freedom Caucus made its choice. Caucus members could have pocketed their wins, declared victory and voted to move the legislation forward - vowing to keep working to improve the bill. But unable or unwilling to accept success, they chose instead to deliver Trump a major defeat on the first legislative effort of his presidency.

"The result," one senior GOP official told me, "will likely be that the White House will no longer negotiate with them in future debates and will go to moderate members and Democrats to get things done. The House Freedom Caucus has made itself irrelevant."

Indeed, Trump is already writing them off. He blasted the group on Twitter, declaring, "Democrats are smiling in D.C. that the Freedom Caucus, with the help of Club For Growth and Heritage, have saved Planned Parenthood & amp: Ocare!" And in an interview with The Post's Bob Costa on Friday, Trump said his strategy going forward will be to let Obamacare fail and then work with Democrats to fix it. "We'll end up with a better health care plan. A great plan," he said, adding, "And you wouldn't need the Freedom Caucus."

That's the lesson Trump took from this experience: Democrats whose motto is "Resist!" would be more reasonable partners to work with than the Freedom Caucus.

Thankfully for conservatives, Democrats have thus far shown no interest in working with Trump. Perhaps, one day, Obamacare will deteriorate to the point where Democrats are willing to put aside their feelings and cut a deal. If they do, it will be far a more left-leaning, big-government approach to health care than anything the Freedom Caucus opposed in this legislation.

Will the Freedom Caucus learn from its mistake? The group has already lost one member, Rep. Ted Poe, R-Texas, who guit over the health bill debacle, declaring, "Saying no is easy, leading is hard, but that is what we were elected to do. Leaving this caucus will allow me to be a more effective member of Congress and advocate for the people of Texas. It is time to lead."

Poe is right. Freedom Caucus members need to understand that they are not in the opposition anymore. In the opposition, you can vote to repeal Obamacare 60 times without giving much thought to what comes next. But governing is different. Governing is messy. You have to make compromises and concessions. The goal is not to support the most conservative legislation; it is - to paraphrase William F. Buckley's famous rule - to support the most conservative, viable legislation that can win.

Freedom Caucus members had a chance to repeal the individual mandate and the employer mandate. transform Medicaid, end \$1 trillion in Obamacare taxes, expand health savings accounts and defund Planned Parenthood. Instead, they chose to keep Obamacare intact.

They failed to lead. They chose to think and act like an oppositional minority, instead of a majoritarian political movement. Unless and until they choose otherwise, they will never fundamentally change the direction of America - which, one assumes, is why its members ran for office in the first

Republican plan to replace the Affordable Care Act, aka Republicans Don't Care Act.

Perhaps Rep. Roskam is not actually a pro-life proponent after all. Rep. Roskam needs to do the moral thing and withdraw his name and support for this bill right away. I am not sure why, but between this bill and his support of the Republicans Don't Care Bill, it sure appears he has a deep-seated hatred of Americans.

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contrast, Tillerson's use of mundane Chinese Foreign Ministry rhetoric described a bilateral process and did not place China in a privileged position over democratic U.S. allies. Still, in the future, the secretary will want to find his own words to characterize relations with China, which - as he pointed out in other parts of his public remarks - are highly competitive but do hold the potential for greater cooperation.

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· "All options are on the table " with North Korea. Tillerson also took a bit of heat for this statement at his Seoul news conference Friday. But this is exactly the warning that a Hillary Clinton or Jeb Bush administration would probably be sending right now. Over the past year, Pyongyang has raced toward its goal of fielding an intercontinental ballistic missile capable of striking the continental U.S. with a nuclear warhead. It has deployed hundreds of missiles capable of reaching Japan, South Korea and U.S. bases on Guam and showed a willingness to employ biological or chemical weapons when it allegedly ordered the assassination of Kim Jong Un's half brother in Malaysia using VX nerve agent. The U.S. is unlikely to choose a preemptive military strike, but it is critical at this moment to reiterate long-standing U.S. policy

toward North Korea: that all options, including military and even nuclear options, will be considered, as necessary, to deter attacks on our homeland

Tillerson was also right to state that 20 years of diplomacy with North Korea has "failed," particularly after Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi declared two weeks ago that the U.S. and North Korea were like "two accelerating trains coming toward each other" and proposed a new diplomatic approach based on a U.S. freeze of military exercises in exchange for a North Korean freeze of missile tests. This was a ludicrous proposal on several levels - not least because of the alleged moral equivalency between the U.S. and North Korea and China's own effort to bow out of the problem. Tillerson minced no words in putting Beijing on notice that China needs to step up.

· Japan and nuclear weapons. In an interview with the Independent Journal Review, Tillerson hinted that, in light of North Korea's repeated missile tests, Japan might need to develop nuclear weapons down the road. If the intent was to pressure China to exert greater pressure on Pyongyang, then waving the "nuclear Japan" warning will not work. It would be much more effective simply to demonstrate that

North Korean actions are enhancing strategic trust and solidarity with U.S. allies - a geopolitical trend that can help shake Beijing out of its complacency on North Korea. In any case, the answer was ambiguous enough that it will have little impact on China, North Korea or Japan for now.

Overall, Tillerson sent the message he needed in order to gain some traction on North Korea. The confusion that has emerged over his intentions has more to do with the Trump administration as a whole than with his own performance, President Trump vowed as a candidate to make unpredictability a hallmark of his foreign policy, and he has shifted positions on fundamental questions, such as whether the U.S. will defend allies or maintain the one-China commitment that the past six presidents made the basis for U.S.-China relations. Tillerson hit the right tone, but U.S. foreign policy needs an effective chorus backing him up in Washington.
