The Board reviewed the regular board minutes, financial statements and bills. Grala moved and Schubert seconded a motion to approve the minutes of the regular meeting for April 18, 2017, the monthly financial statements for the fiscal year through April 30, 2017, the Bill Reports for April/May 2017, and payment of the bills. Motion passed 6-0. See #3 on attached sheet.

VIII. Librarian's Report

- Scholtz reported that the library has several new staff members as well as staff who have taken new positions in the library. We are fully staffed at the present time with 54 staff members, amounting to 43.1 FTEs. Scholtz said that due to the new administration lifting limits and restrictions in the Affordable Care Act, we are not concerned about reaching 50 FTE now.
- Grala asked about the attendance for the April 2017 in-service as reported in the Librarian's Report, which said that there was 62% attendance by staff. She asked if attendance at an in-service is mandatory. Scholtz said staff is expected to attend but that there had to be some exceptions due to scheduled days off, part-time staff with school or other jobs with hours that conflicted, as well as other obligations. Scholtz informed the Board that the library would be closed Saturday, June 24th so that staff could go to the ALA Conference in Chicago as an in-service.
- Grala asked about a comment in the Librarian's Report saying that there was less attendance in the library and that managers would be considering ways to try to improve it. Scholtz pointed out that the library provides remote access to electronic materials and reference sources that aren't counted in the statistics about library visits. He also mentioned that libraries are used more when the economy is down and less when the economy is better and patrons can afford their own books and print or electronic subscriptions. This led to a discussion of the proportions in the collection of digital materials compared to physical, "shelvable" materials. There was further discussion of alternate ways that the library serves the public beyond circulating materials and answering reference questions.
- Grala reported that she had been approached at two different times by members of the public who complemented Mariann Cairo, Youth Services for her service to them when they were in the library.

Dear Mayor Jett,

I emailed you on two separate occasions (5/10 and 5/25) without a response regarding a concern about our existing sanitary sewer line (see paragraphs below in different font). Since I haven't had a response, I felt it necessary to write this letter in hopes of setting up a future meeting to discuss the issue. Please note that, a few months ago I met with some of your staff (see description below) about the situation but it was not resolved to my liking nor with any responsibility toward city services and intergovernmental cooperation. I know you do not like to get in the way of your staff and let them do their job (which they do admirably by the way) but I feel that, in this instance, they are not seeing 'the long tail' of the problem and that this course of action sets a precedence for future cooperation or non-cooperation, relative to related government bodies. Below is the extant of my emails to you:

I'm writing to you due to problem that we may have in the near future. The McHenry Public Library is a separate taxing district but the building is within the city boundaries of McHenry and, as such is subject to all of the building codes, annexation laws, services and fees for those services that any other business or residence incurs on a normal basis. The library has a long history of being associated with the city (1936-1987) and then becoming its' own taxing district in 1987. But it still is a destination place for many residents, now being located on the Route 31 mid-city corridor. We do a pretty big business - almost 900,000 circulations per year with over 500,000 residents coming into our 38,000 sq. ft. building on 4.35 acres. The library has a long history of being in McHenry and is a destination point for many McHenry residents. You indicated that you want McHenry to grow, businesses to expand and prosper. For many businesses, the Library attracts other businesses because it promotes traffic but doesn't compete with those businesses. So, it is good business to have us within the McHenry city boundaries rather than in an outlying area.

In 2010, it was discovered that the Library had a private, undersized sewer line (6 in.) that was shared with 2 other businesses (Low Insurance and Berkshire Realty). That line broke - the Library repaired it/re-lined it with a resin lining for the length of the pipe (from library point to Meadow Ln.) at the Library's cost. The City's Public Works Dept. helped us locate the problem and televise the line and I thank them for that help. The line is now repaired and is functioning properly; however, I have a great concern for the future. The current line is undersized and old (installed 1974 - 43 years old) and in need of replacement. About 3 months ago, I had a conversation with our Alderman, Victor Santi about this situation and he basically said he couldn't do anything about it because it was a private line. He also suggested that he could help us find more suitable property elsewhere. At this time, moving isn't an option and besides the location is good.

A few months ago, I also had a meeting with city officials (Derik Morefield, Jon Schmitt, Kevin Beggs and Russell Ruzicka) about this issue. I wanted the City to consider putting the Library on city water and sewer through a city-speced and properly-sized, individual pipe, rather than the antiquated, communal, undersized line we currently have. At our cost, we asked an engineering firm to price out a lift-station, required for moving waste water to our North, under Rte. 31 (about \$275K) and we've begun negotiations with the Illinois State



Dept. of Transportation for possible connection of the lift station (when built) to be connected to the North, under Rte 31, when the re-building of Rte. 31 takes place. This re-build may take place in about 7-10 years.

My son is a PE Civil Engineer working for Sioux Falls, SD and, in looking at the area, was unsure why we actually needed a lift station in town. My father was mayor of Rockford for many years and, one of the mainstays of city life/benefits as well is the providing of essential services (like sewer/water, etc.). We do pay a sewer/water fee each month. I also am willing to pay to have a private sewer line installed so that we can disconnect from the communal, privately owned line that is destined for failure within the next 5-10 years. The city management group that I spoke with was unwilling to negotiate any connection talks or even accept some measure of responsibility for a public sewer line - I found that extremely disheartening - especially since I feel that is one of the essential services that a city provides to residents/business owners.

I came to McHenry in 2007, being hired to build a new library but the referendum failed for a number of reasons. In hindsight, that failure might have been a good thing because, if we had built the building, we could not have connected to any city sewer line. A fact that we didn't know at the time - it took a pipe break and a geyser of muck in 2010 to give us insight into the problem. A question I have is that, if we were to sell the added property to another entity, they would not have access to city water or sewer because there is no way to connect to those services. Within a land-locked area in the middle of town, that fact of not being able to connect to essential services is incomprehensible to me – it makes the land worthless. Also, the City of McHenry had plans to develop that corridor at one time, enlarging the Metra station and developing both businesses and living condos – in the same fashion as Arlington Heights has done and as Fox River Grove is planning to do. How would those businesses and living areas been connected with water and sewer?

I am not trying to be a pest but, since I haven't received a response, I'd like to schedule a meeting with you to discuss the issue. The only reason that I persist in my quest for city help in connecting to city sewer through other than an out-of-date, undersized, privately-shared line is that I don't feel it is a 'fair' practice because we pay the same water rates as other businesses who have city maintained lines. We have repaired/resin-lined the private sewer line, at the Library's expense for all parties involved but it is a 40-year old line which won't last forever and we don't really want to entertain re-building a shared, private line when the time comes to do so. Water and sewer should be infrastructure that is supplied by the city within city limits. The Library is not opposed in any fashion to paying its' fair share to connect to city sewer in a traditional single-server manner. Thank you in advance for your consideration and response in this matter.

McHenry County College trustees discuss prevailing wage, disagree on ordinance

<u>CRYSTAL LAKE</u> – Although McHenry County College Board of Trustees members agreed they don't like being required by the state to support prevailing wage requirements, they remained split on what to do about it.

At Tuesday night's Committee of the Whole meeting, the board spent more than a half-hour talking about whether the board should support a prevailing wage resolution.

In the end, the decision largely is symbolic. Even if the board opposed the resolution, the college still would have to pay the wages required by state law.

State law requires local government bodies, such as the MCC board, to adopt the wage schedule each year. But although voting to reject the schedule carries no penalty, a government that willingly pays workers less than prevailing wage is illegal. Elected officials can be charged with a Class A misdemeanor, and the body itself can be subject to fines, which would be paid by the taxpayers.

The resolution states that it is mandatory for all contractors and subcontractors who are hired by the college to pay all laborers, workmen and mechanics employed by them not less than the general prevailing rate of wages.

MCC President Clint Gabbard said that although he believes it's a "ridiculous resolution to pass," he is concerned that if the board doesn't endorse the resolution, the community college would risk losing state and federal grants.

"Every time I sign on for a federal or state grant, it asks me that question: 'Do you agree to comply with all state and federal laws?' The prevailing wage act is often singled out as including this particular law," Gabbard said.

MCC Board Chairman Chris Jenner said he was on the Cary School District 26 Board for eight years and at least three of those years the board did not pass the prevailing wage resolution. Other local governments have taken a similar stance in the past, <u>including the McHenry County Board</u>.

"Prevailing wage police never came for us," Jenner said.

Later into the discussion, Gabbard asked for a straw poll where trustees stood on the issue.

Jenner said he can't support it.

"[I] find having a gun to my head morally wrong," Jenner said. "... I understand if it fails what risk we're at. I get it. Just the way that this is structured, the force that is being put onto us is wrong."

Vice chairwoman Diane Evertsen agreed with Jenner.

"As long as you continue to pay prevailing wage, the fact that I disagree with it is not going to negatively impact the college," Evertsen said.

Evertsen said she can't support it.

"Absolutely not – I won't vote for it," Evertsen said. "I think it's an intimidation tactic, and I won't comply with that."

Trustees Linda Liddell, Ronald Parrish, Mike Smith and Justin Peters said they'll support it during the meeting. Trustee Molly Walsh was absent, and Trustee Karen Tirio said during the meeting that she's unsure of where she stands.

Liddell said she wouldn't want to jeopardize the risk of grants for the college, and she wants the board to continue to voice their concerns to the state separately.

"Let's follow the law, let's try to change it at the state," Liddell said.

"To Trustee Liddell's point of view, there's no reward for this institution in formally voting against it, and in essence, publicly stating that we are willing to violate the law," Smith said. "There's no gain."

Gabbard said he's also in support of signing the ordinance.

Around the county, McHenry Township, <u>consisting of new trustees</u>, ultimately voted against the ordinances, and the Marengo City Council unanimously voted Monday in support of it. The McHenry County Board in past years has voted <u>against the prevailing</u> wage ordinance.

In two weeks, the board will be asked to vote on the prevailing wage act resolution.

That meeting will be June 29.

Letter: What's prevailing wage?

To the Editor:

"Prevailing wage" is one of those curious terms we hear every spring. Prevailing wage is defined as the hourly wage, usual benefits and overtime, paid in the largest city in each county, to the majority of workers, laborers and mechanics. Prevailing wages are established by the Department of Labor and Industries, for each trade and occupation employed in the performance of public work.

McHenry County Board members are required by law to pass a resolution stating they understand the adjusted prevailing wage for public works projects. The federal government, which provides some of the monies that pay for the public projects, needs to know the officials who disperse the monies understand the rules. It's the law.

Last year, only 10 of our 24 County Board members voted "Yes" that they read and understood the rules. Fourteen board members did not, but they made it clear to the county staff they needed to abide by the rules. Charges could have been brought against the board members; they could have been fined and jailed. Our county district attorney wouldn't do that though, so they were not concerned.

This is a simple, automatic resolution that taxing bodies have been passing since shortly after the Civil War. The law has helped our country work efficiently and effectively. The County Board needs to pass it and get down to important business.

I will be contacting my County Board members and attending the 7 p.m. County Board meeting June 20. You should too.

Section Five: Except as otherwise provided by law, no further appropriations shall be made at any time within such fiscal year, provided that this Library Board may from time to time make transfers between the various items in any fund not affecting the total amount appropriated, or appropriations in excess of those authorized by the Budget in order to meet an immediate and unforeseen emergency by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Trustees present and voting, as provided by 75 ILCS 16/30-90 et. seq., and this Library Board may amend this Budget and Appropriation Ordinance from time to time by the same procedure as prescribed by Statute for the original adoption of a Budget and Appropriation Ordinance; provided, that nothing in this Section shall be construed to permit transfer between Funds required by law to be kept separate. Any remaining balances after the close of this fiscal year up to twenty percent (20%) of the appropriation shall be available until August 30th for the authorization of payment of obligations incurred prior to the close of the fiscal year, and until September 30th, for the payment of such obligations, and any remaining balances shall be available for the transfer to special reserve to be accumulated, as provided by 75 ILCS 16/40-50.

<u>Section Seven</u>: This Ordinance is passed pursuant to statutory authority and the Illinois Public Library District Act, 75 ILCS 16/30-55, et. seq, 75 ILCS 16/30-85 et. seq.; and 75 ILCS 16/40-50 et. seq.; and the Illinois Revenue Code, 35 ILCS 205/157 et. seq., and other statutes hereunto appertaining.

<u>Section Eight</u>: This Library Board hereby certifies that all applicable provisions of 35 ILCS 215/1 as amended, ("The Illinois Truth-in-Taxation Statute") have been complied with.

Section Nine: Pursuant to 35 ILCS 200/18-165 this Library Board hereby determines that no surplus of funds is available for any debt, obligation, liability, operation, fund or account for any purpose, and accordingly the abatement and reduction of provisions of the Personal Property Tax Replacement Fund Act are not applicable thereto.

Section Ten: This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval, and publication, according to law, and any resolutions or ordinance in conflict therewith are hereby repealed; and should any part of this Ordinance be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall affect only that part of this Act specifically covered thereby, and shall not affect any other provisions or part of this Act, but shall be severable therefrom.

AN ORDINANCE ASCERTAINING PREVAILING WAGES WITHIN THE MCHENRY PUBLIC LIBRARY DISTRICT MCHENRY, MCHENRY COUNTY, ILLINOIS

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois has enacted "An Act regulating wages of laborers, mechanics and other workers employed in any public works by the State, county, city or any public body or any political subdivision or by any one under contract for public works." approved June 26, 1941, codified as amended, 820 ILCS 130/1 et set. (1993), formerly III. Rev. Stat., Ch. 48, par 39s-1 et seq. and

WHEREAS, the aforesaid Act required that the MCHENRY PUBLIC LIBRARY DISTRICT of McHenry, McHenry County, Illinois investigate and ascertain the prevailing rate of wages as defined in said Act for laborers, mechanics and other workers in the locality of said Public Library District employed in performing construction of public works, for said Public Library District

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE MCHENRY PUBLIC LIBRARY DISTRICT, MCHENRY, MCHENRY COUNTY, ILLINOIS:

Section 1: To the extent and as required by "An Act regulating wages of laborers, mechanics and other workers employed in any public works by State, county, city or any public body or any political subdivision or by anyone under contract for public works," approved June 26, 1941, as amended, the general prevailing rate of wages in this locality for laborers, mechanics and other workers engaged in construction of public works coming under the jurisdiction of the District is hereby ascertained to be the same as the prevailing rate of wages for construction work in McHenry County area as determined by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois as of June 1, 2016 a copy of that determination being attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. The definition of any terms appearing in this Ordinance which are also used in aforesaid Act shall be the same as in said Act.

SECTION 2: Nothing herein contained shall be construed to apply said general prevailing rate of wages as herein ascertained to any work or employment except public works construction of the District to the extent required by the aforesaid Act.

SECTION 3: The Secretary shall publicly post or keep available for inspection by any interested party in the main office of this District this determination of such prevailing rate of wage.

SECTION 4: The Secretary shall mail a copy of this determination to any employer, and to any association of employers and to any person or association of employees who have filed their names and addresses, requesting copies of any determination stating the particular class of workers whose wages will be affected by such rates.

SECTION 5: The Secretary shall cause to be published in a newspaper of general circulation within the area a copy of this Ordinance, and such publication shall constitute notice that the determination is effective and that this is the determination of this public body.

In-Library MIGRATION TEAMS

Library staff will be involved in the migration process in many different ways. In addition to participating through Library Staff Advisory Groups, each library will form an In-Library Migration Team. Within each library, staff will need to participate in training, data testing and configuration work. The in-library migration team will be responsible for making sure that internal library needs are met. The number of staff on teams will vary library-to-library. Libraries are encouraged to structure their teams to meet their specific needs, with someone responsible for areas listed below. Libraries can assign one individual to be our main point of contact for all 5 of the areas listed below, or can divide the duties among multiple staff members. Submit the information for your In-Library Migration Team using this form by May 31, 2017.

Watch our Roles & Responsibilities video to learn more about the different migration responsibilities.

- Library Lead & Training Coordinator: Responsible for coordinating the in-library training schedule. Serves as point person for communication with CCS that does not clearly fit into another category.
- Data Testing: Will coordinate internal review of the test load data and provide feedback to CCS. Will communicate and follow up with CCS concerning data corrections and other updates to the test data.
- 3rd Party & Peripheral Testing: Will test library's 3rd party products and other services that will integrate with Polaris leading up to the migration. Will test and configure peripherals.
- PowerPAC Setup: Will configure/customize the library's PowerPAC profile to meet community needs.
- Patron Communication: Changes to the library ILS will need to be communicated to library users well in advance of the migration. To help ease the transition, CCS will create training materials and other documentation that can be freely shared with the public. Each library will have a staff member responsible for communicating with CCS any patron needs and with distribute training and educational materials to end users.





ye epening enside book offers insight on need to take time off

Zzzzzzzzip.

That was the sound of your last weekend as it passed by, but it probably doesn't matter anyhow: it was packed with work, to-dos and obligations, kid's sports, and more work. Sometimes, you wonder why you even bother. You might as well just go to the office - but first, read "The Weekend Effect" by Katrina Onstad before you zip out Friday afternoon.

When was the last time you had two full days

without plans?

If you're like most working adults, answering may take you a few minutes. Chances are, it's been awhile; like millions of North American employees,

our weekend is "not a weekend at all."

Much like the seven-day week, weekends are man-made things: Ancient civilizations created our modern week, the Old Testament demarked a day of rest, and employers tried forcing workers to toil most of both. In 1791, U.S. carpenters held the first strike over hours; the eight-hour day started to take hold in the late 1800s; Henry Ford introduced a fiveday workweek in 1926; and generally, there we were until the digital age, when employees could - and do - carry work with them everywhere.

Considering 15th century serfs enjoyed a holiday-filled church calendar, Onstad said, you may work more now than did a medieval peasant.

That's not good for mind or body, and employers are starting to recognize that. Known for obsessively-focused marathon workweeks, Silicon Valley may taketh away, but it also giveth: some high-tech startups offer employees flextime and demand downtime. Your boss may welcome happier employees who aren't so stressed. Four-day workweeks aren't rare anymore, nor are half-day Fridays.

And yet, Onstad said, if someone asked you what you'd do with free weekends, you might struggle with a list. Think: you actually can visit with real people, in-person. You could volunteer more, read more, attend more church, or go for more walks.

In short, you can stop and learn to do less What would you do with two unencumbered days? Imagine the possibilities, and then read "The Weekend Effect."

While it might seem few people need convincing when it comes to taking time off, Onstad shows, in her first pages, why some people feel trapped into working more. Readers might see themselves in some of Onstad's short profiles - we obviously have compatriots in our drivenness - as we learn why a "cult of overwork" is detrimental to both individual and to a business. Yes, we can brag, but it's unsustainable and we're hurting ourselves, as

Once you have the ammo needed to try to make change, Onstad offers things that might now take up that newly gotten free-time. There's a surprise in that: whatever you think you like to do on your weekends, you could be doing it all wrong.

This book is eye-opening, but it may also tell you something you already know; you work too hard. For confirmation, though, or for more reasons why you need shut off your phone and find a hammock, "The Weekend Effect" has that all zipped up.





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to keep its head above water

Row, row, row your boat.

That's not the only way to get around in the water, but it could be the driest one going gently down the stream. Still, you must do it carefully, carefully, carefully because, as in the new novel, "Into the Water" by Paula Hawkins, there's no merrily when someone dies.

Danielle "Nel" Abbott didn't jump.

Then again, maybe she did. Or maybe she merely got careless at the top of the cliff overlooking the river locals called the Drowning Pool, and she slipped. Everybody knew Nel was doing research on the Pool and the women who died there through the centuries, beginning with the teenager accused of witchcraft; Nel's own drowning in the Pool would've been the last chapter.

For the people of Beckford, Nel's death might've been just another unfortunate part of the Drowning Pool legend, just a sad single mother who had too much to drink ... except that Katie Whittaker went into the river just weeks before. Poor Katie had loaded her backpack with stones and drowned herself one summer afternoon. Her family, of course, still grieved – as did her best friend, Lena, Nel's daughter, who knew exactly why it happened.

Jules Abbott hadn't spoken to her sister in years. She hardly knew Nel anymore, not since they were kids, not since Nel betrayed Jules in the most horrible way. They'd never really been close anyhow, and that estrangement complicated things. As Lena's next of kin, Jules was faced with

raising a 15-year-old she barely knew, a girl who seemed to hate her.

And so Jules began talking to the ghost of her sister. Nickie Sage, the "psychic" in town, said she couldn't reach Nel clearly, but Jules could. She felt Nel's presence in the house, in the town, by the river. She could hear Nel's voice, and the words Nel wrote in her manuscript: "Beckford is not a suicide spot. Beckford is a place to get rid of troublesome women."

For the first many pages, reading "Into the Water" is a lot like looking up toward the surface from the bottom of a lake: everything's murky and slow, and you really can't quite make out who or what you're seeing. Slowly, though (ever-so-slowly), author Paula Hawkins pulls readers up through the depths, character by clue, until we're grounded and panting from the adrenaline rush that is this novel.

Indeed, it's difficult to tell which is more heart-pounding: the eerie ghost-filled past that haunts Beckford, or the creepy residents who seem to know a little bit too much about one another. Both, perhaps, added to the universal fear of drowning, make this a novel that literally will keep you guessing (and shivering) until the very last chapter.

You may struggle with the beginning of this book, but stick with it. It takes awhile to get settled, but once you do, this is the most unsettling book you'll read this spring. For you, novel lover, reading "Into the Water" is a dream.



After the May 17 event, the series will take a summer hiatus resuming in September, after which it will recur the third Wednesday of every other month from 7 to 9 p.m.


